We cannot go through all the cases here, nor would it be profitable if We did; just let us mention one or two. Here is a man with that disease, Alas! Too common in a all lands---consumption. As far as possible we keep Such cases out of the hospital, at least in their advanced stages, as the Amount of good we can do them is small, while the danger of their Spreading the disease is great. Among these patients are not a few Laid aside as a result of their own evil habits. The boy in this bed has Had one of the old-fashioned buffalo carts over his leg, and we meet with Few more serious accidents. After a serious operation, and many weeks Of danger to his life, he is going at length to escape with little worse Than a stiff ankle joint. Next to him is a man attacked internally by blood-sucking worms, one of the commonest serious diseases of this region, but one, happily, which can be cured. Here is a man with Beriberi, another of the dangerous complaints of tropical lands, and more difficult to cure. In this bed is a man who was shot by the head-hunting savages of the high mountains; the bullet passed through his elbowjoint, which fas since been stiff, and he is waiting for us to fashion him a new joint. By him is another man with cancer of the lip, also waiting for operation; while here. alas! Is a man dying of dropsy, come too late for anything but to ease his last hours.

But we must leave this ward, or we shall never get our round
